Writing a Research Statement

A research statement is a <u>statement of purpose</u> for a research related position. The main goal of a research statement is to <u>showcase one's research experience and interest</u> and <u>how they tie in</u> <u>with the position</u> being applied for. Always remember to <u>"Compliment and Complement"</u>: compliment the work of the research group you are applying for and highlight how you can complement their work with your future plans.

DO's and DON'Ts

DO elaborate and give specific examples, always choose 'few but specific' over 'many but general'
DON'T include too much information outside of research, you are not telling a personal narrative
DO highlight the impact of your work, catch their eye with your achievement however small it is!
DON'T make factual error, or give them any preventable trivial reasons to not want you
DO research the position and mention specific aspects that excite you, this shows your dedication!
