#### **Courses Designed and Taught**

Introduction to Poetry Writing: In this module, students are introduced to the different elements of poetry. Using each of these elements (sound, line, form, voice, etc.) students are allowed to expand their repertoire of skills and to extend their different writing practices. Readings in this course are geared toward initially the individual poem,

and then to the sustained poetry collection. Final projects involve the completion of a portfolio of original and exciting poetry, and an interview with a contemporary poet.

Advanced Poetry Writing: Building on the skills learned in the introductory module, this course is designed towards the completion of a chapbook of poems (20-30poems). Emphasis is made on the development of a manuscript, but also the expansion of the notion of poetic voice. Projects in this course are geared towards historical investigation, hybrid genres, and image and text manuscripts.

Daily Themes: Perhaps the most rigorous and exciting writing course I have ever taught, this module is a test of both endurance and innovate. Students are expected to write 300-word essays 5 times a week over the course of a whole semester. Each week explores a theme. Each day, each student receives a prompt from me from which they write their essay. A collection of their best writing is submitted at the end of the module.

Philippine Literature: American Period. Cross-registered as a module in Historical Inquiry, this course explores Philippine Literature in English during the American occupation of the Philippines (1900-1945). It is a creative writing course, then, that is designed as a way to explore the process of writing as it is shaped and inspired by historical inquiry. Philippine literary texts, the first to be written in English by Filipinos in the twentieth century, serve both as models and jump off points for creative writing projects. This blend of literature, history, and creative writing is rare in this field and is potentially a model that I can expand and adapt in the future. It brings to the fore the possibilities of exploring a postcolonial history as it shapes the writing practice of a particular culture to serve as models of creative writing for students in the contemporary setting. The projects that were written in this course, which I taught last year, included a poetry collection, a hybrid essay, a play, even an imagined anthology made from a computer program that had been fed samples of poetry from this period in Philippine history.

*Nonfiction Writing Workshop*. This is a reading course and writing workshop on contemporary creative nonfiction, with an emphasis on experimental creative nonfiction, personal essay and lyric essay .

# **Senior Capstone Advising.**

I have successfully been able to mentor senior Arts Hum majors in their capstone projects. Four out of the five years I have been advising have my advisees receiving the Best Capstone Award: Hamid Roslan (2017), Adam Lau (2019), Yaim Chong Chia (2020) and Cheang Chu Ying (2021). Hamid Roslan's parsetreeforestfire, was published by Ethos Books, and has recently been awarded the finalist for the prestigious national award, Singapore Literature Prize of 2020 (Poetry), an amazing feat for a debut book of poems. Adam Lau's book, meanwhile, documents his experience as a performance artist and proposes a distinct approach to the artist-book: mixing criticism, personal memoir, and poetry. Yaim chia's album, a collection of songs of his personal journey in relation to ideas of home and country and has been successfully released. Cheang Chu Ying created an artist book on grief and the power of retelling.
